On every occasion the monk is greeted with a warm welcome, food (lots of food), and lots of a variety of prayer, lots of serious and fun conversations, and some activities.


When Br. Brendan, OCCO, visited he appropriately chose our theme as **"Hats, Humid, Happiness".**

# THE BENEDICT OPTION

A Contemporary Option from Benedictine Wisdom By +Brother Isaac Simon, OCCO



It is quite apparent that American society, for a variety of reasons, is in a downward spiral morally, ethically, and spiritually.

As an avowed religious person, I have decided to pattern my life in such a manner that I can find solace and strength in community, in worship, and in religious practices which strengthen my walk with God and helps me to discern God's call on my life.

I think encouraging the wider Christian communities to engage in similar practices, to a limited degree, affords them a similar opportunity. But more importantly those same Christian communities become distinct examples of what it means to be Christian in today's world; and it allows those communities to become places others may turn to for nourishment and nurturing in their everyday lives.

Being set apart, like an avowed religious, is not something everyone can do; but having a communal religious life (community of believers one can gather with) and corporate religious life (formal place of worship) both embedded in one's secular life can provide some semblance of the monastic lifestyle which imparts a Godly peculiarity and distinction that may draw others who are seeking to survive in a degraded culture. Amen.

This is the premise of the book *The Benedict Option* by Rod Dreher. He espouses the idea that Christians wherever they may find themselves become the antithesis to the morally decadent cultural practices evident in the world today. These Christians can provide a powerful apologia and a living testimony to the One Who Was, And Is, And is to Come



# On August 24, 2019 Ted Williams our dear friend passed away peacefully surrounded by his family.

I am grateful to have this opportunity to share with you some important moments and accomplishments in Ted's life of which you may not be aware.

First let me say that Ted and I were the closest of friends for nearly 15 years. We shared long hours in conversation, prayer, and he and I sharing wisdom and encouragement.

Several months prior to his first hospitalization he asked me to be his priest, spiritual director during the difficult times ahead. His principal goal was to know and submit himself to God. As you may know Ted was quite a thinker. His rational mind had a difficult time traversing the bridge between himself and his Creator. One day I said to Ted, "put your thoughts, efforts, and rational self aside and listen." We prayed. God spoke. Ted heard. Ted believed.

Months passed and Ted urged me to teach him how to pray and move into the embraces of his Lord and Savior.

Several times later he told me that he was at peace with his death. God is Good.

Ted served on my Abbot's General Counsel as consultant to the Abbot General of the Cistercian Order of the Holy Cross, Common Observance, 501(c)(3).

He received an Honorary Doctor of Letters in December of 2009 for his contributions to the Winston –Salem community and the Cistercian Order of the Holy Cross granted by The Saint Stephen Harding Theological College and Seminary/St. Seraphim School of Orthodox Theology. On July 14, 2019 Ted received the highest honor from The Cistercian Order of the Holy Cross. By Ecclesiastical Proclamation he became a member of the Companions of the Holy Cross.

I thought that you might want to hear Ted's very words.

On one occasion Ted and Janice came to the Cistercian Order's Chapel, in Winston Salem, NC. During the Eucharistic service they both renewed their Baptismal vows. It was an exciting spiritual and personal moment for all of us. After the service Ted and Janice wrote us saying:

#### Nov 3, 2018

Father Rivest / Abbot, I can't thank you enough for your very loving and heartfelt service this morning. I felt that God the Father and Jesus Christ were with me and protecting me. Janice said she had never felt more spiritually healed. She also said she felt like she had two new friends. Please give our thanks to Kathleen as well. She was an important part of the service and I felt like I could feel her holiness, there to support both of us as well as you. Also, thank you for the materials you pulled together for me and for giving Janice your book. There was a lot of love going around this morning. Thank you!

Father Rivest, I want to thank you and your lovely wife Kathleen for the warm and beautiful welcome you gave Ted and me today. But most of all I want to thank you for all you did for us. Ted asked me on the way home how I felt and I told him I had never felt so good about what I believe and my relationship with God than I did at that moment. I know Ted holds you both in high regard and considers you two of his closest friends and spiritual guides. I hope to count you both as that also. He and I have a tough road ahead of us but with God's help and your love and friendship I know our journey may be made a lot easier. Thank you again for your loving care of us today Janice.

# MUSINGS ON THE ESCHATOLOGY OF THE APOSTLE PAUL

#### What is the eschatological view held by Paul, as described in his undisputed letters?

Biblical scholars have suggested that Paul of Tarsus expected the Second Coming of Christ to occur in a short period of time. It seems odd for Paul to expect Jesus to return rather quickly; when the entire known world (at that time) had not been evangelized.

Paul did not initially have an exact eschatological definition of what would happen at the end of the world. Jewish tradition does not contain stories of God being sacrificed. Jewish tradition also does not contain stories of a resurrected God/Supreme Being. The idea of a resurrected God would have been new ground for Paul as a Pharisaical Jew.

However, among Jewish tradition, there were a variety of belief systems due to the various factions within Judaism (Sadducees, Pharisees, Essences, etc.); thus Paul could have been influenced by any number of sources prior to his conversion experience.

Post conversion experience, Paul would have needed to work out what he believed the end of the world would entail. Jews did have the concepts that the world would one day end and God would punish the bad and reward the good. These are all themes found in Paul's undisputed letters.

#### Paul develops and states his views in various ways:

- •Jesus will not return until his enemies are destroyed: 1 Corinthians 25 26
- •Christians will be persecuted until Jesus returns: 1 Thessalonians, 2 Corinthians, and Philippians.
- •Christ's enemies can be eliminated by converting them, i.e. preaching the gospel. Romans 11, 1 Corinthians 15

But, how did Paul connect Jesus to his eschaton? What specific things needed to happen in order for the end of the world to occur? Finally, does Paul's eschatological views evolve or change as his letters are written?

We pray also for those who may have given up hope or have forgotten to pray for themselves.



Our purpose is to: a) seek perfection.


b) praise and worship God



While there are traditional qualifications for ordination/incardination, the principal interest is discerning a true vocation and developing Priests or Deacons who are fruitful ministers. Therefore, educational requirements may be individually tailored.

We celebrate valid apostolic lines of succession, the seven sacraments and liturgical worship consistent with the historical churches. While some practices may differ, e.g., married clergy, we adhere to the dogmas constituted by true apostolic teaching.
