

#### Rev. Br. Mervin, OCCO

The Abbot says: Br. Mervin has labored sacrificially in the Philippines for many years overcoming difficult obstacles. We are proud to have him representing the Order. Please let us keep him and his work in our prayers.

On November 15, 2010 I was invited to visit National Bilibid Prison, Maximum Security Compound with the Anglican clergy named Rt. Rev. Ronald Rae of the Communion of Evangelical Episcopal Church that religiously follows the Anglican Tradition.

We visited the inmates in Bilibid and learned that they needed a priest who will take care of their spiritual life and other religious needs. We discussed about the other possibilities until we arrived at a conclusion to start immediately the mass on the coming Sunday. We first used the church of the Aglipay and served their faithful and other roman catholic parishioners.

We served these faithful for six years, until such time that their priest arrived and we decided to leave the church and started a new ministry inside the Bilibid. We were very fortunate because the gang named, "Happy Go" in Quadrant 3 accepted us and offered a place in their place that we could use as our chapel. We started our Sunday Mass on January 10, 2016. We had a very fruitful Mass. After two months we decided to appoint worthy vestry. These appointed members of vestry were really very responsible. We also started our "Lay Leaders Training". We were able to produce four faithful and aspiring deacons. They served the altar and assisted us in other religious activities. I have four acolytes, three good men as my laities.

Before President Duterte assume his post as president we were allowed to stay inside the Bilibid for five hours. Immediately when replaced Ninoy, he changed everything. He appointed new director and deployed the Special Action Force (SAF) to guard the Bilibid.

Policies were changed and for seven months we were not allowed to enter the Bilibid for reasons we did not know. W hen we were informed that we can no continue the prison ministry everything was new. Priests, Nuns and other religious leaders were frisked and asked to remove garments to ensure that we were not bringing contraband inside the Bilibid. Even though it was for us very insulting we submitted to the new policy. This policy is until now being implemented. We do not know when and how will we stop this or request to exempt us from this frisking. But we will not let the enemy stop us. We will continue the ministry and will not let the devil overpower us. We love already them and we offered already our lives to God to serve the lost, the last and the least.

Last November 18, 2017 I presented an action research in St. Paul Seminary, Silang Cavite. This seminary is managed by a Diocese of the Roman Catholic church. In the presentation I informed the audience about the situations inside the Bilibid. I informed them that the religious programs of the church have had effect in the transformation of the inmates even the hard core criminals. In fact I had an acolyte who once was a hired killer but he repented and served God. He realized that he needs to have Christ as his Lord and Savior

It is true that we may have doubts about his claims but we must remember that his situations are totally different from us. He may be manifesting unnoticeable changes but his desire to live a pure and clean life is his heart. He even shared to me that he once was invited to go back to his old life but he refused and mentioned that he is now a servant of God. Praise God for his life.

Now among those who went up to worship at the feast were some Greeks. So these came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and asked him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." (John 12:20-21)

The world is a busy place. As technology advances, human time and space becomes ever-more filled with distractions. However, the Season of Lent gives us an opportunity to simplify our lives and focus on connecting with God. This opportunity arises through the combined use of fasting and prayer.

Religious fasting is found throughout Holy Scripture. Fasting clears the mind of worldly distractions. Prayer, when combined with religious fasting, helps one to become more sensitive to the presence and power of God; and to "hear" Him speak via the Holy Spirit.

In Holy Scripture, the crowds chased after Jesus. The crowds knew if they could cross paths with the Son of God their lives would be made whole. They needed Jesus in so many ways. ### Listen With The Ear Of Your Heart By Abbot Oscar Joseph, OCCO

"Can you hear me now?" "Can you hear me now?" The narrator repeats the question over and over throughout the popular commercial. This is an Interesting phrase that both markets his product and mirrors your personal need to be heard.

You need to be heard. You don't necessarily have to agree or support me but please, please hear me. When you hear me, I am validated. I become a person of some value. To be validated I will talk on the cell phone about trivial nonsense, chatter all day about nothing important to anyone who will listen, or even create an argument to get attention. This is a sad state of affairs to be sure.

Let us speak about listening skills. You can recall what you know about listening skills by remembering what Mamma told you, "You have two ears and one mouth so listen more than you speak." Actually the 90/10 rule came from this. That is to listen 90% of the time and speak 10% of the time. It sure would be a quieter planet.

Active listening means full participation by the listener and response to the speaker. This might include such communication efforts as mirroring. Mirroring is speaking back what you have just heard.

Passive listening is thinking of your response rather than really listening. You could also be viewing a sports channel, reading the paper, or almost anything other than listening. Basically, you are not really present to the speaker and show little interest in what is being said.

The next level of listening skills is "to listen with the ear of your heart." At first that may seem an unusual statement. But slow down for a moment and listen to the words, "listen with the ear of your heart." I think you will figure it out. Listen in such a way that the speaker, or writer, moves you towards transformation.

Imagine listening to your mate complain about his day. Imagine moving to the "ear of your heart" and the effect his words of sorrow, conflict, stress, and failure have on your heart. Your response to him would be different than if you just simply heard the words. You would be transformed, moved, more charitable, and compassionate.

The heart needs you to speak slowly. Look at your beloved. Do not be in a rush. Save your important messages for a time when you are together. Do not discuss them over the cell phone. Touch them whenever something is really important to you. Speak softly. The heart is tender. It gets frightened when you are loud, critical, or sarcastic. Be careful with your words. Say what you really mean. Be clear and precise. Do not continually repeat yourself. The heart hears better with fewer words.

It takes practice "to listen with the ear of your heart." You need to develop a quiet spirit. The quiet spirit is developed through a desire to be present to your beloved. Spend time in quiet. Let there be no noise, no distractions. Listen to yourself. Still your body. Move slowly. Don't always be involved with movement. When you listen your goal is to be in empathic union with the speaker. Look into their eyes. Give them your understanding and respond with few words, a smile, or tear. Mostly be with them.

#### The Rule of St. Benedict, Conversion, Stability, Obedience

The Rule of St. Benedict has influenced the Church throughout the centuries. What is most impressive about The Holy Rule of St. Benedict is the fact that is has been with us for 1500 years and is still relevant and contemporary.

Throughout the centuries it was adopted as a Rule of Life by numberless male and female monastics, religious orders, autonomous monasteries, religious families and congregations, lay oblates and lay associations. The Rule transcends factions, divisions, denominations, rites, politics, and administrative red tape. One can find monastics, religious and lay people living The Rule of St. Benedict alike in all Christian faith expressions.

The Rule of St. Benedict is ecumenical. It covers all the practical aspects of life and is valued as a guide to a simple life lived fully in homes, businesses, churches, as well as monasteries. It leads those living under the Rule towards a holy life and to encounter God face to face, and to create a personal experience with God.

## You might think of religious vows as "dead man walking." Your life as you know it is over. No more smiles, no more friends, no more fun.

Actually religious vows are a vehicle to more freedom. The Rule of St. Benedict is a "guide" to the kind of life that Christians want to celebrate. They want a simple life, lived well.

The last place that a Christian seeks is the whirlwind of earthbound stress, confusion, fear, and fragility.

Following a Rule of Life provides direction on healthy choices rather than making decisions forced upon us by fearful stress. The Rule of St. Benedict is a time-honored way of life that provides guidance on life's challenges.

Conversatio, or conversion of heart, is not referring to one's initial conversion into Christianity. Rather the daily desire to grow and change beyond our current earthbound paradigms. Those changes can be challenging but, having a Rule of Life and other likeminded persons helping you, the pilgrimage becomes rather liberating and exciting. Life begins to become simple. Stability is seeking God within the Cistercian community. It does not mean giving up your church, family, employment, and other responsibilities. The Cistercian community becomes a complementary asset. We think of ourselves as extended family.

We dedicate ourselves to God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit and in all things trusting in the Power of Grace and in the love and support of the brothers in this community.

Obedience is the most liberating of all. It means being able to trust and gain your confidence under the direction of a loving compassionate leader. You will never be asked to do the impossible or anything that is outside of the Cistercian governing documents that include Scripture.

Now your simple life is lived well.

We pray also for those who may have given up hope or have forgotten to pray for themselves.



a) seek perfection.b) praise and worship God




