





From we to thee




It's finally time for me to pass on my mantle to Bishop Isaac Simon.

Ecclesiastes 3

¹¹ He hath made all things good in their time, and hath delivered the world to their consideration, so that man cannot find out the work which God hath made from the beginning to the end. (Douay-Rheims American Edition)

We all have a very human tendency to think of time as a possession. We routinely and reflexively say things like: "I have time," or "I don't have time" or "I've got all the time in the world." And so, we tend to believe and act as though we control the time that we think of as ours.

But the reality is very different. Starting with the fact that we do not know how much time we have (because we did not control when we were born and we do not control when we must die), all we really control is how we use our talents and our energy within each day that we're given.

How we are to use our time is an essential element of our blessed Rule of St. Benedict. Using our time wisely and reverently, reminding ourselves daily that eventually we must die, is a fundamental requirement. At the same time, we are instructed to do all things in moderation and in balance so that we can always pay attention and devote ourselves to matters that will be meaningful in eternity.

So now our Order comes to a time of transition where we say farewell to Abbot Oscar Joseph and welcome Abbot Isaac Simon.

Oscar Joseph has led us for the past 28 years. The Order is very different now from what it was when he took on that responsibility. We have grown in numbers, and we are much stronger organizationally and financially. But far more important than worldly measures of success are the many ways that all of us have been taught and led to grow closer to God and how we have been inspired to be salt and light to our families and our communities around the world.

That transition (or *conversatio*) has certainly been true for me personally. Being part of the Cistercian Order of the Holy Cross has been a life-changing experience. I'm being taught to pray, to listen for God's voice, and how to set my own beliefs and desires so that I can follow Him. And I've been inspired and led to use what I've learned and my God-given talents to help others to find their own paths as God has provided for them.

The Teacher in Ecclesiastes points out that we are not to know or to see God's work in us through to completion. As the Apostle tells us:

I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ. (Phil 1:6 NRSV).

So, what began through Abbot Oscar Joseph will now continue in and through Abbot Isaac Simon.

I believe that Abbot Isaac Simon's talent, education and experience equip to lead us with discernment, patience and grace. I know that all of us pray for him. We ask God to bless him with grace, good health and growth in wisdom. Please help him to see the world as you do.


I welcome our new Abbot General Isaac Simon, OCCO with expectations, an open heart and willingness to take his direction.



The Efficacy of Prayer

What is prayer?

Prayer is the raising up of the mind and heart to God.

How do we raise up our mind and heart to God?

We raise up our mind and heart to God by thinking of God; by adoring, praising, and thanking him; and by begging of him all blessings for soul and body.

(Quoted from: A Simple Catechism – Basic Catechism of Christian Doctrine)

Being a person of prayer, I am often asked what exactly prayer is. I describe prayer as having a sincere, respectful conversation with God. It is a time to acknowledge that we do not have all of the answers. Prayer allows us to transcend the limitations of our humanity and extend our reach to the Divine Presence. It can be difficult to pray for a variety of reasons. But it gets easier to pray the more time we spend engaged in prayer.

Praying does not have to be complicated. Start by reciting the Lord's Prayer, organized prayers found in prayer books/worship books, or by writing down and telling God our prayer needs. We should not be afraid to speak to God. Jesus encourages us to wear God out with an overabundance of our prayers (Luke 18:1-8). Persistence in prayer cultivates within us a greater sensitivity to the voice, power, and presence of God in our lives. Spending time in prayer is spending time with God; faithfulness in prayer will lead to prayers being answered!

"Therefore, in order to keep me from becoming conceited, I was given a thorn in my flesh... Three times I pleaded with the Lord to take it away from me. But he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness."

(excerpt: 2 Corinthians 12: 7-9)

Meditating on the Rule of St Benedict, I reflected on Chapter 4 – Instruments of Good Works. One instrument is "To Put One's Hope in God". When we are confronted with a difficult situation, we ask God to deliver us from the situation. We certainly do not see sadness, poor health, family discord, or financial strife as matters to be embraced.

As Cistercians, we to put our hope in God. This means that we continue to have faith in God even though we may not understand why we must suffer or go through difficult times. Praying daily, reading Holy Scripture daily, studying the Rule, and by imitating Christ, we cannot help but to trust God.

The Apostle Paul, in his second letter to the church at Corinth, explained how God revealed to him that life's difficult situations are opportunities for God to demonstrate His presence in our lives. Thus, these matters become moments of triumph and testimony of what it means to have faith in God. As Cistercians, let us strive to live our lives as a testimony of faithful service to God Almighty.




